

Which Day of the Week Gets You the Lowest Fare When Booking United?

The day of the week you fly — not the day you buy — is the most reliable way to get a lower United fare. Saturday occupies an interesting middle position. On popular leisure routes, Saturday is cheaper than Friday or Sunday because the rush of outbound leisure travel has peaked on Friday and the return rush begins on Sunday. On business routes, Saturday is often significantly cheaper than any weekday because corporate travelers simply do not fly on weekends.

How Much You Can Actually Save by Choosing the Right Departure Day

The savings from flying Tuesday versus Sunday on a popular domestic route can range from \$50 to \$200 per person or more, depending on the route, the season, and the specific dates involved. On a family of four, this translates to \$200 to \$800 in savings on a round trip — a meaningful amount that justifies even some inconvenience in travel scheduling.
